Still quite a few PECTORAL SANDPIPERS & EARED GREBES at Agate Lake. We did not find any Great-tailed Grackles at Emigrant Lake.

The creme brulee of the day, after searching various other meadow locations, was Harry's GREAT GRAY OWL at milepost 19 on Dead Indian Memorial Rd up at Howard Prairie.

OBA 2020 Field Session - Pamela Johnston September 14, 2013

Twelve birders joined Tyler Hallman of Oregon 2020 and me at Tualatin River National Wildlife Refuge in Sherwood for a field session on bird census skills, Sept. 14, 2013. After viewing the birds visible from the visitor center overlook as census subjects, Tyler discussed methods of counting them and ways to make your online reports, your personal citizen science, more useful to formal science. We had a nice flying challenge in the form of American Goldfinches that dip and shift as they go by. We walked refuge trails and considered the best way we could record what we saw, which included Cedar Waxwings, Pileated Woodpecker, and Western Bluebirds.

Once the waterfowl have settled into the Willamette Valley, we expect to put together another session like this at Ankeny NWR, before the CBC season begins. Watch the schedule for the next one. We'd love to see you there to when it's time to tackle a field covered with geese.

Santiam Pass — Leader: Jeff Harding August 11, 2013

Participants in the Oregon Birding Associstion Santiam Pass Field Trip enjoyed cool weather Sunday in the

high part of Linn County, and made a foray into Jefferson County. We tallied 57 species, including a few in Marion county on the way in. Black-backed Woodpeckers put on a show at two locations, vocalizing and interacting. As expected for August, birding was often slow, but we managed to find 9 species of warblers, including an active flock of some 15 Hermit warblers, often coming in close.

Scappoose Bottoms — Leader: John Gatchet March 24, 2013

The Oregon Birding Association Trip to Scappoose Bottoms with an obligatory stop on Sauvie Island enjoyed sunshine and warm temperatures along with 77 bird species. Rentenaar Road proved very productive with the HARRIS'S and two WHITE-THROATED SPARROW that were well seen by our group of eleven. A MERLIN was seen perched in a tree and then flew our direction for all to see in flight. A VIRGINIA RAIL was seen by several and heard by all along Rentenaar.

From the dike at the end of Rentenaar Road everyone got to look as a NORTHERN SHRIKE perched on the fence line running to the east. It kept hunting in the field and returning to it's perch on the fence. At the observation platform we saw a RED-SHOULDERED HAWK sitting in a tree and enjoyed views through the scopes. Other birds of interest were two TUNDRA SWAN and a REDHEAD. An OSPREY was perched on one of the pilings along the Multnomah Channel.

Along the Crown Z Trail in Scappoose Bottoms a CHIPPING SPARROW was seen by some, but this migrant quickly got away from us. VIRGINIA RAIL were heard and again seen by some in the group. Two CINNAMON TEAL were seen well by everyone.

A flock of 69 GREATER WHITE-FRONTED GOOSE were in a field along Honeyman Road in Scappoose Bottoms. This is an unusually large group for this area.

The trip participants worked really well together at locating and identifying birds. This made for an enjoyable trip and a number of individuals gained some life birds.

Hood River County — Leader: John Gatchet February 24, 2013

We had sunshine and light winds on Sunday for the Hood River County OBA Field Trip that started at Eagle Creek and ended at Hood River. No Snowy Owl or Harlequin Duck were relocated, but we had a great group of birders that included Paul Bueschur, Clay Crofton, Dwight Porter and Elizabeth O'Connor. Everyone contributed to spotting, hearing and identifying birds which made this a lot of fun.

Several miles before crossing into Hood River County a PILEATED WOODPECKER flew across I-84. An EARED GREBE at the Cascade Locks Marina was a good find and there were GREATER SCAUP in the area and further east at the Rock Quarry and in Hood River. Two female NORTHERN SHOVELER at the waterfront estuary in Hood River were seen "shoveling" for food. This is a hard to find duck species in the county. One female HOODED MERGANSER was seen on a woodland pond in Cascade Locks and a male and female were on a pond deep in the trees along Herman Creek Road.

Great views of a WESTERN GULL were had by all at the Eagle Creek Overlook and likewise for several AMERICAN DIPPER seen and heard singing on the creek. Dipper were seen and heard singing on Dry Creek in Cascade Locks. A RED-BREASTED SAPSUCKER and two HAIRY WOODPECKER were seen there as well.

Seven BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT-HERON were seen in Hood River. While looking for the Snowy Owl in the spot where it was seen in Hood River we had a dozen YELLOW-RUMPED WARBLER, several EURASIAN COLLARED-DOVE, eight AMERICAN GOLDFINCH, a BEWICK'S WREN and two first year WHITE-CROWNED SPARROW among a group of GOLDEN-CROWNED SPARROW.

This group was a delight to lead and they even had adults and kids looking at birds through the scopes in Hood River.

Yamhill County — Leader: Christopher Adlam December 1, 2012

The OBA trip for Yamhill County yesterday was met with the coldest weather yet this winter, but the fourof us — Andy Frank, Clay Crofton, Rhett Wilkins, and I — were rewarded with some good finds nevertheless. Most notable were 6 SNOW GEESE and 1 NORTHERN SHRIKE on Grand Island, 1 GREATER WHITE-FRONTED GOOSE, 1 HORNED GREBE and 1 GREATER SCAUP at the Sheridan Sewage Ponds. And of course the now famous and reliable FERRUGINOUS HAWK (plus 3 ROUGHLEGGED HAWKS) at Delashmutt Lane. We totaled 58 species for the whole day.

Here are the details:

We were happily surprised at our meeting spot (Grand Island Grocery and Deli at Hwy 221 and Fairview Rd.) to hear and ACORN WOODPECKER and then a WHITE-BREASTED NUTHATCH in an oak grove in someone's backyard.

On Grand Island, the water level was lower than it has been for a long time, and so water birds were hard to come by. Several flocks of TUNDRA SWANS passed overhead and the 6 SNOW GEESE were a good find. Also noteworthy were the flock of 40 MEADOWLARKS, a MARSH WREN, NORTHERN SHRIKE and DARK-MORPH RED-TAIL.

We headed to Durham Lane for the gulls, but unfortunately the sheep had been moved and the gulls were now far away. The handful that remained were THAYER'S, RING-BILLED, MEW and GLAUCOUS WINGED. On the upside, we ran into Paul Sullivan and Carol Karlen there. A few minutes later Pam Johnston drove by. A real social hotspot, with a great panoramic view of the dump!

We followed Paul and Carol to the hawk field and enjoyed the FERRUGINOUS HAWK, 3 ROUGH-LEGGEDS and 11 RED-TAILS.

We then left our escort and headed for the Sheridan Sewage Ponds, where we found:
