Place - 5 miles west of Glide, Or.

Time - 10 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. June 26, 1984

Habitat - Large (60 ft. +) deciduous trees 200 ft. from a creek. Open grassy fields all around.

Temp. - Very sunny, sultry

First thing noted it's loud call heard by me over 300 feet away and with the engine running while we were chasing sheep. When I stopped the pickup Wally Sumner heard it and no question as to ID from it's call. (Che-bee) (repeated constantly)

The bird seemed to have a big head and held upward when singing which was almost all the time. It mainly stayed in the middle of the trees. Once on top and once flew down to the barbed wire fence.

It was very whitish-gray underneath no yellowish anywhere. Also noted the large eye-ring. And it seemed slightly smaller than the Dusky Flycatcher we saw later.

Other birders - Martha Sawyer, Lucille Glassford, Becky Sumner, Wally Sumner, and myself.

Previous experience - spent a year in Alberta where they are abundant. They nest in similar habitat as this bird was in.
