TENNESSEE WARBLER (VERMIVORA PEREGRINA)

LOCATION: WESTON, UMATILLA COUNTY, OREGON

DATE: MAY 22, 1980

THE BIRD WAS SEEN FOR SEVERAL MINUTES (OFF AND ON) FROM AS CLOSE AS 35 FEET. THE LIGHT WAS GOOD. I USED 8x40 BINOCULARS.

I WAS ORIGINALLY ATTRACTED TO THE BIRD BY ITS SONG, A SONG THAT I HAD HEARD BEFORE BUT DID NOT RECOGNIZE. THE BIRD WAS A MALE IN BREEDING PLUMAGE.

IT WAS THE SIZE OF MOST WOOD WARBLERS. THE BILL WAS THIN AND POINTED. THE TOP OF THE HEAD WAS PLAIN GRAY. THERE WAS A WHITE, QUITE CLEAN, SUPERCILIUM. THE FACE WAS COLORED WITH GRAY. THE THROAT AND ALL OF THE REST OF THE UNDERPARTS WERE UNMARKED OFF-WHITE. THE BACK, RUMP, AND TOP OF THE REPTICES WERE GREEN. THE WINGS WERE GREENISH-GRAY, WITHOUT BARS.

I AM FAMILIAR WITH THIS SPECIES AND CERTAIN OF THE IDENTIFICATION.
